TUSCALOOSA, AL—The Alabama Black Belt Commission's Small Business Development Committee and the University of West Alabama's Small Business Development Center will once again hold their Homegrown Small Business Conference on Friday, September 25, 2015.

The conference, to be held at Shelton State Community College, 9500 Old Greensboro Road, will feature keynote speakers Lucy Farmer and Martha Hawkins. Farmer, owner of Lucy's Inspired, reclaims antique architectural hardware to create jewelry. Based in Cullman, Farmer has been featured in *Southern Living* and *Fresh Style* magazines. Farmer will deliver the opening keynote address, and her jewelry designs will be available for sale at a 15% discount for conference participants.

Hawkins is the owner of Martha's Place, a soul food restaurant in Montgomery. Hawkins has gained national media attention, and several celebrities have dined at her establishment. Hawkins will deliver the luncheon keynote address and will be available to sign books during the event.
